Introduction

Nau mai, haere mai! The first formal Te Aitarakihi newsletter – Pūrongo Kōrero mō Te Aitarakihi is here. We plan to send them out quarterly at this stage.

2021 has been a period of enormous growth for our organisation. We have changed from a Charitable Trust to an Incorporated Society so our name is now officially 'Te Aitarakihi Society Incorportated' but we will mostly use the name "Te Aitarakihi". This is the part of the organisation that is charged with running the day to day operations with our management, administration, social services and the Multicultural Centre. With that, our kaitiaki land Trust that has now formally changed to a Charitable Trust and is now known as 'Te Aitarakihi Whenua Trust'. This Trust is a vital part of our organisation, but does not interact directly with the public.

In March this year we were fortunate to recieve funding to offer a Kaiwhakahononga Hapori (Community Connector) Service and has been a magnificent addition to our our kaupapa (more on that in the newsletter).

With our growth we have employed additional staff and added additional office space to keep up with the growing administration requirements. Keep an eye on our facebook page "Te Aitarakihi" as we introduce our team in 2022.

Te Aitarakihi Soc. Inc. is governed by a Board and at our last AGM a new Chairperson, Damon Odey, stepped up into the role along with four new Board Members join us. Raeleen de Joux stepped down from the Chairperson role she has held for the last four years and made a massive contribution while she was at the helm. Now that Raeleen has stepped down from that arm of the organisation, she has taken on the role of Chairperson of the Whenua Trust – so we haven't lost her and the value that she brings to Te Aitarakihi.

With the new COVID traffic light and vaccine pass system now underway, Te Aitarakihi has altered the way it can operate with these new considerations. More details on that on page 11.

Te Aitarakihi Taumata Rōpū, is the kaumatua advisory group to Te Aitarakihi on tikanga, kawa, and other matters pertaining to protocol and customs.

I am the current chairperson and preside at meetings held monthly, which are attended by a number of kaumātua, namely whāea Huriata Weeks, Raeleen de Joux, Puhiwahine Melrose, Dawn Rangi-Smith, Margie Goldsmith (our Taumata Rep on the Te Aitarakihi Board) mātua Rawiri Ormsby, Hohepa Holland and Piripi Edwards. Other kaumatua have also been approached in the community to attend these hui to bring their voice to the table. Mā te wā, ka tae rātou.

I will report on these hui at Te Aitarakihi Marae-a-iwi and will give a brief outline in our up and coming newsletters "Te Pūrongo Kōrero a Te Aitarakihi". The latest kōrero from Taumata involves the processes to be observed at Te Aitarakihi due to the COVID traffic light system. More on that further in the newsletter.

Kaumātua hui

Whaea Ani Haua presented this report from a recent hui held at Te Aitarakihi Marae-a-iwi.

Tēnā koutou katoa.

Our kaumātua were invited to attend a luncheon to support an initiative from the SCDHB to support efforts to reach out to rangatahi and other sectors of our community to become vaccinated

It was a very successful hui led by Joseph Tyro, SCDHB, who outlined his brief to those who were in attendance, which generated a good discussion, which became emotional at times, as kaumatua expressed their concern at the number of younger and middle aged members of our community who were choosing not to vaccinate

Efforts to help to spread the word from Te Aitarakihi kaumatua are being realised by the release of photographs and messages to the community, encouraging the non-vaccinated sector to consider their stance and to be mindful of the elderly, the at risk, and the young members of the community.





Kapa Haka

Te Aitarakihi is fortunate to have a strong kapa haka roopu with around 80 regular attendees. The latest lockdown and subsequent restrictions on the number of people that can gather and maintain the required distancing, meant that the roopu could not meet weekly until the weather was friendlier and practice could take place outdoors. They ended up being able to meet for a couple of weeks but with the recent traffic light system, kapa haka decided to end early for the year and will Kapa haka will resume in the new year. What's been on this year

Waitangi Whānau Fun day – Held on Saturday 6 Feb.

A busy day to commemorate the signing of Te Tiriti o Waitangi. A day of education, fun and educational activities along with hangi and other kai on offer.

Tāne Ora South Canterbury

For Tāne (males) - aged from 16 and over. Tāne in the community, supporting each other and creating a safe space to awhi what's going on in their world. The group is based at Te Aitarakihi Multicultural Centre and includes hikoi around the area i.e the beach, the māra etc.

This group meets fortnightly on a Wednesday evening from 5.30pm. They recently had their last hui for the year and next hui will be on 2 Feb 22.

Haptūanga Wānanga

Was run for the first time in March as a collaboration between SCDHB and Te Aitarakihi. It is an antenatal class but through a Māori lens and was attended by hapū whānau. Just the one course was run this year and we would like to see it run again in the future.

Raranga Wānanga – 8 weeks

These wananga are an introduction to flax weaving to become familiar with:

- Tikanga o te Harakeke & self
- Harvest Practice
- Preparation Practice
- Weaving Practice

During these wananga you will have the opportunity to weave an object/taonga of your choice. Two wananga have run this year and we plan to offer them again in 2022.

Te Aitarakihi's Kia Piki te Reo programme is facilitated by the wonderful team from Kia Piki te Reo. This year has seen a lot of action for us since Term 2:

Kia Piki te Reo: Taumata 1 & 2 - 10 weeks during term time.

Taumata 1-2: are our beginner classes that go right from the basics for super beginners, through to basic sentence structure, tense, pronouns, and possessive.

Three of these courses were run this year starting in term 2. Registrations will be sought shortly for Term 1 2022.

Kia Piki te Reo: Tuakana Reo - 6 weeks

Tuakana Reo: is a six week program. That will have maori speakers from our community and move into more complex structures. Completion of taumata 2 or prior re Māori knowledge is required. This course was run during Term 4.



Kia Piki te Reo: Whaikōrero

These classes are to support our tāne to become confident kaikōrero when sitting on the paepae during the pōwhiri and mihi whakatau process. This course is run differently and does not have a set duration, rather a more traditional model of learning where tāne can join when there are vacancies and move through at their own pace. Initially learning what whaikōrero is, its origins and traditions through to constructing whaikōrero to deliver. The classes are open to all tāne connected to Te Aitarakihi and in the Aoraki rohe who are ready to take the tohu and step into the whaikōrero realm.

This course meets fortnightly on Wednesday evenings (alternate weeks to Tāne Ora) during term times and started in Term 2.

Hine Ora - 18 Oct - 20 Dec 2021 (10 weeks)

This wonderful collaboration between Te Aitarakihi and Warrior Princess Workshops is designed for young women ages 17-25 years. The wānanga equips young women with tools to look after themselves, especially during this sometimes stressful time of the year.

By creating this safe space, we hope to empower these young women to understand their mental health and well-being. During this workshop they made journals and learned how journaling can be an awesome self-care tool. Discussions on coping strategies, sharing stories and learn about the stories of Atua Wāhine. Ko Au Ko Koe, Ko Koe Ko Au (I am you and you are me) – two days per month

This is a collaboration between a number of local social service providers to assist, encourage and show our local people the various different opportunities in the local community such as education, careers, job opportunities etc. Whānau attend for the two days to learn new skills and be exposed to the options available to them.

The first of these was run in July and then the lockdown occurred and the subsequent restrictions. More will happen in 2022. Watch this space!

Also, this year during November we had our first Cultural Competency wananga that was offered to all of our community:

'Ki Te Whai Ao' Professional Development – Cultural Competency

A three-day intensive Professional Development program:

Day 1 – 9am till 4pm
Whanaungatanga–Building connection and understanding:
Tikanga – Māori world view.
Te Takiwā – Local history or our area
Te Reo – Basic reo Māori and pronunciation
Day 2 – 9am till 4pm
Te Titiri o Waitangi - Understanding both sides
Ngā Hua ō Mua - The impacts of our NZ history
Mana Ōrite - Equity and critical consciousness.
Te Reo – Basic reo Māori and pronunciation.



Day 3 – 9am till 4pm

Kawa Whakaruruhau - Cultural safety. Hanga Arawhata - Building bridges Whāinga Whakautu - Response planning

This course is facilitated by Kia Tika te Ara and was well attended by local and out of town businesses and schools. It is self-funded so it has a cost associated with it.

The programme is aimed at businesses, educators and other organisations that want to develop their understanding of New Zealand history and how that history affects how New Zealand looks and feels in todays landscape. The aim being that this is understanding will in turn change how you view and manage situations that may occur within the workplace and life.

I am primarily based at Te Aitarakihi at 50 Bridge Road, Smithfield, and every Thursday at 17B Royal Arcade from 9am – 12pm. No appointments needed, please come by and have a korero.

This role is to connect whanau with the services that they need to thrive and feel connected

Additionally, as part of the Community Connector team we have:

Hāmi Goldsmith - Kaitakawaenga Hapori (Community Liaison) & Kairuruku Tūao (Volunteer Coordinator)

- **Connect whānau to Te Aitarakihi** Provide support related advisory and information services to people and whanau or to people of specialised agencies/managed facilities or targeted people via telephone, face to face or internet
- Offer cultural understanding / support to business and community organisations. Established regular liaison with the community, government and non-government agencies, district councils, local rūnanga and other service provider networks.
- **Organisation of events** Information on hirage, pricing, availability of the Whāre facility of Te Aitarakihi.
- Volunteers Chairperson of volunteer komiti information available on request.

Irene is the administrative arm of Te Aitarakihi's Social Services and can assist whānau



Notice of importance

As of Friday 3 December, Te Aitarakihi is now a venue that requires you to show your vaccine pass to enter onto our premises – this includes land and buildings. The exceptions are noted future in the emails.

- Sign in using the COVID app or COVID sign in sheets.
- Masks are to be carried at all times and you may be requested that you wear them, depending on the activity taking place at the time.
- Social distancing to be practised.
- For powhiri and mihi whakatau, non contact or elbow bumps instead of hariru, kissing, hugging or hongi.
- We may ask for photo ID with you vaccine pass if you are new to Te Aitarakihi.
- These rules can be updated at any point but will be reviews around the 17 Jan when the government reconsiders what colour (traffic light) we will remain on/change to.

If you cannot show a vaccine pass, and are accessing a service located at Te Aitarakihi, the following conditions apply:

Whānau accessing He Manu Hou (Early Learning Centre):

- Drive into the carpark as normal
- You must wear a face covering at all times
- Do not enter any other Te Aitarakihi buildings other than HMH
- Whānau to take the child into HMH and the sign in desk may be set up at the entrance contact 03 681 717 or the manager 0210 8399 768 for support.

For whanau seeking social services from out Kaiwhakahononga Hapori (Community Connector), appointments need to be booked as your appointment will coccur off site – contact Te Aitarakihi kaimahi on 027 286 8885 or 027 274 4489 to make arrangements.

During a global pandemic, how we operate can protect our community that is vulnerable at this time. Protecting whakapapa is central to Te Ao Māori (Māori world view) and the tikanga (customs) do change depending on the circumstance. After consideration of many factors including the consultation of kaumatua at Te Aitarakihi. We have made the decision that will best allow us to serve our whanau and manuhiri (guests), as we navigate the COVID traffic light / vaccine pass system.
